## **FEEDBACK 1**

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### **INDUCTION/ORIENTATION PROGRAMME**

What did this involve, how long did it last, was it useful?

I was greeted at the airport by a buddy who then brought us to the dorms and helped me get settled in. She then came back the next day and took me to the school to ensure I was inducted properly by signing all forms, receiving timetables etc. On top of this there was an induction weekend for exchange students where they went to another Czech town and spent the weekend playing games and getting to know each other. I personally decided not to do this because the people in my flat were not and it just didn't seem like my sort of thing. On the whole, I found the induction process very straightforward and had no problems.

The teaching style in Prague was rather similar to that in Manchester. Larger lecture classes with smaller seminar classes. The lecturer using powerpoints and asking questions. I did find that a lot of the material covered in Prague I already had studied in previous years. In semester one I experienced difficulty with one class as I felt the lecturer was not committed and sometimes just did not turn up to class so I found that particular class quite bad. Assessment was slightly different in Prague. They had many multiple choice exams, mid terms, presentations and essays per module but I preferred this as it took some of the pressure off final exams.

### **MBS INTERNATIONAL TEAM**

I only have good things to say about our International Team. I felt very prepared before going and once out there I knew I could always email if I had any problems. For example, when I lost my MasterCard Cash Passport it was sorted out immediately by Manchester with just one email from me.

### **MBS SECOND YEAR MEETINGS**

In Prague, the dorms were a system of room sharing. Obviously this is never done in the UK so was quite daunting. I don't remember being told about this in the early meetings but was informed later in the year by the girls who studied there. Perhaps in future it could be directly told to the Prague exchange students ASAP so they can possibly sort something out if they so wish.

### **HOST INTERNATIONAL OFFICE**

I found the VSE exchange office very helpful, on demand and friendly. I rarely had to speak to them except for sorting out Erasmus bureaucracy and I only ever faced positivity.

### **INFORMATION ON ANY ADDITIONAL COSTS**

Cost of living in Prague is generally very cheap. Transport pass for 6 months was £45. Books were available from the library and apart from food etc, I can't recall any other major costs.

## **ACCOMMODATION**

As previously mentioned the dorms are shared rooms. I was fortunate enough to be put in a room with Josh, the other Erasmus student and good friend, but still... It was a challenging experience. There was no common room so it was very much when you're home you're on your bed with little to no privacy. On top of this there was no oven, microwave or freezer so cooking was pretty tricky. However it worked out at being 100pounds a month so you can see the positive. There were times it was getting to me so much and I didn't want it to tint my whole experience so for my second semester I found my own flat. It was still cheap (220 a month) and had the advantages the dorms did not. I would recommend going to the dorms definitely for the first bit because you meet all the people and if it really gets to you, you can move out but definitely try it. You don't want to miss out on stuff and become lonely.

Prague is in such a prime location of Europe so Josh and I did a lot of travelling. We went to Spain, Germany, Italy, Poland, Slovakia and the Netherlands. It is also very cheap so we were able to go out a lot in the local clubs and restaurants. We didn't meet a lot of the Czech people as they tend to be pretty unfriendly (understatement of the year!) toward 'tourists' but there were lots of other people from all over the world we got to know.

## **FEEDBACK 2**

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### **INDUCTION/ORIENTATION PROGRAMME**

The accommodation is very basic. Students share a room that could take a bit of getting used to for some people. I was lucky that I knew the person that I was sharing with so there was not any problems. I got to meet a lot of people and have some really good experiences with them. Also, when group presentations were set we could all meet up easily. So all in all, even though it was out of my comfort zone to start with, when I look back I would not have had the same year abroad if I had not stayed in the student accommodation.
